#### WFRS VICE PRESIDENT REPORTS

Angela Bokor, VP for Central and Eastern Europe

After a mild winter, the summer of 2024 was hot in Central and Eastern Europe. Nevertheless, the roses thrived and we could admire their beauty. At the end of the summer, I visited several rose gardens.

The first one was Mark Rosarium in Acsád, Hungary. It has a collection of more than 1000 varieties of roses, mostly bred by Márk Gergely, the most prominent Hungarian breeder, but also from Szilveszter Győry and Stefan Wagner (rose breeders from the region). On the list of varieties registered at the National Centre for Biodiversity and Gene Conservation there are also historical roses bred by Rudolf Geschwind, Michael Horvath, and Rudolf Palocsay. A relatively new rosarium, it was founded in 2013. The maintenance has been done by the president of the Márk Roses Friends Association, Pocs Margit with little help. As the rosarium is the only place where the roses bred by Márk Gergely (more than 700 varieties) can be found, it is important to support this garden. Thanks to sponsors, the WFRS was able to help Márk Rosarium with a 4000-euro grant.

Next visit was at the Rose Garden in Olomouc, Czech Republic. More than 50 years old, the 3,5 ha rosarium displays a large and varied collection of species, historical and modern roses. Under the professional management of the director, Jiri Malaska, the rosarium was revamped and new varieties are constantly added. Jiri is a dedicated rosarian and organizes lectures and workshops to share his knowledge about roses. Every year a rose festival is organized, and this year a rose bred by Lukasz Rojewski, 'Rozarium Olomouc' was baptized during the festival. The rosarium is well maintained, all the varieties are labeled and there are also resting places and benches where the visitors can spend a relaxing time. The collection was declared as the National Collection of Roses and has a special area with roses bred by Czech and Slovak breeders. The rosarium was nominated for the WFRS Garden of



Excellence Award and in my opinion, it really deserves that. For those who want more information about Olomouc Rosarium, there is an article by Jiri Malaska in one of our Regional Newsletters https://bit.ly/3ZHVY4j




Aflopark is a private garden in central Poland. Based on an old garden with fruit trees (which are preserved) the garden has several



parts nicely interconnected. With a huge variety of species, plants and with collections of echinaceas, daylilies, hydrangeas, clematis and peonies and roses which is a place for the common visitor who wants to relax and also for the specialist who can deepen his knowledge about plants.

When I visited in September, the roses were in full bloom, with new growth and healthy foliage. There are around 550 varieties and there is an area where the roses are planted by colour. A newly opened part is the Victorian Garden where roses are planted, mostly bred by Lukasz Rojewski.

Kutno, in Poland, is the City of Roses and has been so for more than 100 years. In 1912, the Eizyk brothers started a nursery near Kutno and were offering over 900 varieties of roses. Their wish was that Kutno to become a city of flowers. Later, Boleslaw Wituszynski bred roses which are still growing in Kutno: 'Kutno', 'Marylka', 'Kopernik'. Every year the City Council and the Cultural Centre organize the Rose Festival and in September 2024, the 50<sup>th</sup> festival was a special and spectacular event. As usual, the Polish Rose Society was involved, organizing the Rose exhibition both for professional producers and amateurs.



In February 2024, Szilveszter Győry, a Slovak amateur rose breeder, passed away. A former ship engineer, he started breeding roses after retirement and he left us about 200 rose varieties, mostly miniatures and micro-miniatures. He named his roses after historical places and personalities. The majority of his roses can be seen in the Rosarium in Acsád and the Slovak Rose Society also planted some in Dolna Krupa, in the park of Chotek manor house. #### WFRS VICE PRESIDENT REPORTS

On April 9, 2024, I went to Sanya to attend the International Rose Festival. Sanya is a tropical city in Hainan Island. The Yalongwan Rose Valley was started about 12 years ago. It has become an important tourist attraction and resort in Sanya. The cosmetic products made from rose essentials are impressive. Guests from Bulgaria and Mauritius attended the festival and shared their love about roses. An art exhibition about roses was also held at the time.

The Pierre-Joseph Redoute Art exhibition and Seminar was held in Shenzhen Artron art center from April 13 to May 12, 2024. The exhibition was organized by Southern China Sci-tech University, Shenzhen Time Landscaping Co. Ltd, and the Chinese Rose Society. All the art works were collected by Mr. Zheng Nan who managed to collect from Europe. Together with the art exhibition, a rose show was held, focusing on China roses that were painted by Redoute. I attended the exhibition and gave a talk during the opening ceremony. Professor Tian Song and Dr. Wang Guoliang gave lectures to the audience after the exhibition.

Shenzhen is warm and the climate is subtropical. It's not the best place for rose cultivation. However, Shenzhen people like the roses so much that the rose garden was built 30 years ago. Every year, a rose show is held in the Renmin Park in

Shenzhen. Shenzhen Time Landscaping Co. Ltd was engaged in promoting and growing roses in subtropical cities. They cooperated with Meiland International to seek heat-resistant roses and made good progress.

I went to Shenzhen for another trip on May 18 to attend the opening ceremony of a rose library in Xiangmihu Park. The Rose Library is adjacent to Xiangmihu Park and they have a big rose garden. Dr. Wang Guoliang and I gave lectures to the public, talking about the history and culture of roses.

In April and May, we went to Ningbo to assess the rose garden at Ningbo Botanical Garden as a candidate for WFRS Award of Garden Excellence. The garden is fantastic with modern roses, species roses and old China roses. Many new wedding couples came here to take wedding pictures. The local government also has designated the garden as a place of marriage registration site, just because the rose is the symbol of love.

In July, I went to attend the Nordic Roses held in Kalmar, Sweden. Miss Naizhe Ji from China also attended the convention. She is the first ever scholar winner for young people by WFRS. With the funding from WFRS, she attended an International Convention for the first time. She was every excited to meet rosarians from many countries. She was happy to visit rose gardens and learn from the lectures. She said: It was really a great honor to attend the convention. I have gained a lot from this trip. I hope that I can attend the rose convention and hope more young people will fall love with roses.

In April, the most exciting rose exhibition this year was the Rose Competition of Chengdu Horticultural Expo 2024. Roses from more than 70 organizations or companies were part of the competition. Among them, the new varieties were very exciting. As more and more rose breeders take efforts in breeding new varieties, a lot of new varieties are issued. Some of them are of good quality in repeat-blooming and disease resistance.

#### FRIENDS OF THE FEDERATION SCHOLARSHIP AWARD WINNER 2024

#### A REPORT BY JI NAIZHE

I am extremely honored to have been awarded the WFRS Friends of the Federation Scholarship, which led me to participate in the WFRS Regional Convention & Heritage Roses Conference Sweden (or called NORDIC ROSES 2024). This was my first time attending an international conference overseas.

The NORDIC ROSES 2024 was held in Sweden in July, a month characterized by long daylight hours and pleasant temperatures, making it the best season to admire roses in Sweden. Our itinerary mainly covered southern Swedish cities such as Kalmar, Helsingborg, and Jönköping.

During the convention, we attended numerous rose-related presentations. We also visited five distinctively styled rose gardens: Solliden Palace & Garden on the island of Öland, Fredriksdal Rosarium in Helsingborg, Sofiero Palace & Garden in Helsingborg, Rosenlund Rosarium in Jönköping, and Kalmar Rose Garden in Kalmar. We also toured the Rose Gene Bank at the Agricultural University of Alnarp in Skåne and the newly established International Rose Trial at Rosenlund Rosarium. The itinerary was intense yet enriching. Beyond lectures and tours, the organizers seamlessly integrated the beauty of Sweden and roses into the entire trip. The Baltic Sea outside the congress center, dinner at Borgholm Castle, lunch buffet in the rose garden, all left us with deep impressions and fond memories.

In terms of rose presentations, experts from Sweden, the UK, the USA, India, Japan, Denmark, Poland, and other countries presented. These speakers held diverse professions, including botanists, journalists, pianists, landscape designers, ecological

archaeologists, historians, breeders, and exhibitors. Most of them held certain positions in their respective national rose societies or the World Federation of Rose Societies. The reports covered various aspects such as the construction of gene banks, rose gardens, roses in painting art, and the history of rose breeding from perspectives such as women, amateur breeders, different countries, and key germplasm.

For me, as a young breeder and scientific researcher, absorbing knowledge about roses from multiple aspects is highly beneficial. Especially gaining a multi-faceted understanding of the history of breeding not only allows for a deeper comprehension of breeding strategies that can be applied to my breeding work but also helps to appreciate roses and even rose-related artwork.

Regarding the rose garden tours, the Swedish Rose Society was very thoughtful in selecting the rose gardens. All five gardens had their unique characteristics. Solliden Palace & Garden and Sofiero Palace & Garden are Swedish royal gardens, while Fredriksdal Rosarium is a historical rose garden which is divided into one section with historical roses and one section where the roses are arranged in various color themes. Rosenlund Rosarium was awarded the international prize 'Award of Garden Excellence' in 2022, making it the first Swedish rose garden to receive this honor. The garden displays diverse rose planting methods such as flower corridor, beds, hedges and borders. The garden is also good at plant combination. The climbing rose and the apple tree constitute a rose tree, resulting in an aesthetically pleasing structure that enhances garden landscape. Furthermore, the climbing rose in combination with Actinidia kolomikta forms a flower corridor. *Actinidia kolomikta*, commonly known as hardy kiwi or Arctic kiwi, is characterized by its lush foliage and small edible fruits. When these two plants are paired together, they enrich the visual effects of the corridor. Kalmar Rose Garden is a child-friendly rose garden with a small area and diverse functions, suitable for children to play and adults to relax. It also boasts a rich variety of plants and a rose corridor designed according to children's height. It provides a reference for creating small gardens in urban spaces.

I also took many photos of these five rose gardens for reference and learning. Besides breeding and scientific research, our daily work also involves the application of roses. In the two months after returning to China, I participated in a rose garden construction project. The trip to Sweden also provided me with many references.

The convention also gave me the chance to meet many new friends and reconnect with old ones. After the convention, Mrs Girija Viraraghavan from India and I reconnected, leading to the introduction of varieties bred by her husband, Mr. Viru Viraraghavan, to the Fairy Lake Botanical Garden in Shenzhen. China, which is currently underway.

In summary, acquiring the scholarship has greatly broadened my international perspective in the field of roses and laid a good foundation for my future work. It is a treasure in my life. I feel very fortunate to be the first recipient of 'WFRS Friends of the Federation Scholarship' and hope that more young people will develop a love for roses, pursue their rose careers, and join the family of the World Federation of Rose Societies!

#### ROSE HISTORY IN SOUTHERN AFRICA

Roses are not indigenous in the Southern Hemisphere. It is recorded that rose plants were brought along with Jan van Riebeek. Subsequent settlers brought roses with them, often cuttings rooted in potatoes. Dr Gwen Fagan did tremendous research and this was published in her by now world-famous book *Roses of the Cape of Good Hope*.

It is not by chance that so many of these old treasures are found on farms in the Karoo. The old roses, now regarded as Heritage Roses grew into formidable dense shrubs and in such a way shading and protecting their roots. A second wave of roses were brought to the Grahamstown region with the 1820 settlers. It was only very recently that a rose known in the region as 'Grandmother Wiggill' was identified to be *Rosa moschata plena* and propagated from a shrub still growing on a farm. Presently plants of this rose are shipped by Ludwig's to descendants of the Wiggill family. The Heritage Rose Society of South Africa was and is

involved in several regional "memory gardens" actual Heritage Rose Gardens showing as many of the old roses grown the odd hundreds of years ago.

Another rose that arrived at that time was *Rosa rubiginosa*, the Eglantine Rose also known as the apple scented rose due to the distinct apple scent that exudes from the leaves, not the petals. This rose set hips easily. Birds ate the hips and distributed the seed around the countryside. Rose seed will only germinate after it has been subjected to frost. This is the reason why this rose has become a nuisance all over the edges of the Drakensberge which experience a cold even snowy winter. Hips are still being harvested and processed for medicinal purpose, but also for rose hip jams and other edible products.

These early wild roses grew relatively easily from slips or runners and were obviously distributed from farm to farm. The five petalled white *Rosa canina* aka "Dog Rose", *Rosa laevigata* or the Cherokee Rose is still seen growing over fences mostly in the Western Cape.

Well over a hundred years ago a specialist rose nursery was established in Grahamstown issuing a catalogue listing over a thousand varieties. Likely the rose plants offered for sale where all grown on their own roots. (Unfortunately, I have not been able to get hold of such an old catalogue).

Nurseries that were established in the Western Cape to propagate fruit

trees (peaches, plums, apricots, apples which also belong to the Rosacea family) by budding and grafting on a root stock included roses into their programme. The novelty roses of the days were already hybrids of the tough European types and the much more tender, but also repeat flowering roses that came from China. They did not have such natural vigour and did much better when bud grafted onto a root stock.

I came across a catalogue from a Parys Nursery on the Vaal River of 1928 listing around a thousand varieties. Checking them through I found that we still propagate and sell about twenty of them these days.

All rose plants were still field grown, dug up in winter (June/ July) and shipped bare root to the private customers all over the country and also exported to Mozambique, Rhodesia (now known as Zimbabwe), Angola, Zambia and Mauritius.

Several Rose Nurseries had agreements representing new rose hybrids from Rose Breeders in Europe and the USA.

Rose Shows and Exhibitions were held during October in many cities and towns. The executive of ROSA (Rose Society of South Africa) was attending the initiation meeting of the WFRS in NZ. A World Rose Convention was organised and held in Pretoria in 1979 and later two Regional World Rose Conventions.

In the decades of 1960 to 2000 florist type cut roses were grown in fields under 30% shade cloth for local and very much for export to Europe in our growing season from October until April.

Over the past 25 years the growing of florist type cut roses moved to Kenya and now also to Ethiopia, being on the equator where they are able to produce year-round without additional heating and lighting, as has happened in Ecuador and Columbia.

From a slow start after much experimenting with timing and soil mixes Ludwig's pioneering work to propagate and grow rose plants from inception, still budded on rootstock, in black 1-gallon plastic plant bags worked out well. By then garden centres popped up everywhere and they were very pleased to be able to purchase rose plants in flower for re-sale on a regular basis. The growing and selling of bare root garden roses has virtually come to a stop in South Africa.

However, it was not just the rose plant production that was changed, but also the release of new varieties. Whereas it was custom for rose nurseries to order budwood of new varieties (which now arrived by air) from rose breeders in Europe and the USA, repropagated from them and released a new variety, these were too often to be short lived since they were not really suitable for South Africa's hot climate.

Ludwig Taschner had been in correspondence with rose breeders for some years and was given exclusive agreements for testing their new varieties for a number of years. It meant annually budding a few plants of several hundred numbered varieties, planting them out, caring for them and observing their performance with regard to sun hardiness, vigour, quick re-flowering, fragrance, firm petals that do not wilt in the hot sun and very much a certain hardiness to fungus diseases.

Corresponding with the breeders on the performance of their roses Ludwig Taschner was given the green light to name and release of their new varieties which did not perform in the colder climates. Over the past 40 years Ludwig's selected over 300 varieties many of these named in honour of SA personalities and places and some have found their way to Australia and the Sunshine regions of the USA.

#### THE MAGIC OF MOTTISFONT

Mottisfont Abbey, located near Romsey in Hampshire, England, has many attractions to offer. Sheltered in the valley of the River Test, it's a splendid twelfth century Priory and country estate, with surrounding imposing landscape and resplendent gardens. It was gifted to Britain's National Trust organisation in 1957. A swift flowing tributary of the River Test runs through the grounds, supplying a copious amount of water to the estate. Over the centuries, this immense asset gave rise to the name Mottisfont – "the meeting place by the fountain." However, the 'jewel in the crown' of the grounds is shrouded within the confines of Mottisfont's walled garden. During midsummer, rosarians and like-minded rose lovers from all corners of the globe converge through its gates to revel at the masterpieces and treasures that form the United Kingdom's 'National Collection of Old-Fashioned Roses' (pre 1900). Visitors are able to enjoy the subtle colour tones and heavy fragrances emitted by the blooms, that has been captured in the past by the finest Dutch masters, and by such assiduous rose collectors like Empress Josephine at Malmaison.

This year marked the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary since the collection was officially recognised for its prowess in the conservation of old-fashioned types. The collection within the walled garden was created, through the diligence and absolute determination given by the eminent English rosarian and Gardens Advisor to the National Trust, Graham Stuart Thomas. He was a great advocate of heritage roses. During the 1960's, old varieties were generally out of favour with the general public, but as a distinguished plantsman and author, Mr. Thomas felt compelled to write a trilogy of rose books between 1955 – 1965 to ensure that everyone could become fully aware of the fine characters of older types. His diligent literary efforts proved fruitful, and the public became mesmerised by the charms that older cultivars have to offer.

The primary objective at Mottisfont was to conserve the old French varieties, but over the years, many rare and unusual historical cultivars have been added. Graham Stuart Thomas was mindful of the site's immense potential. The area was originally the site of the kitchen garden and contained established trim boxed hedges, crossing central pathways, which focused on eight sentinel Irish yews around a pool and fountain. It was a superb example of perfect geometry. The large walling not only embraced the overall design, but would protect any vulnerable rose species from prevailing strong winds and bouts of heavy frosts. The Trust's Centre in the nearby City of Winchester were most supportive of the project by arranging a joint appeal with assistance from the Royal National Rose Society to raise the sums required to purchase the roses and plants required to furnish the garden. Rosarians from around the world acknowledged their passion for older types, by generously donating money. By 1972, the garden was reasonably well established, and thus opened its gates to an adoring public. Initial visitor numbers were very encouraging, which was testimony for their growing appetite for antiquated cultivars. The herbaceous borders were cleverly planned by Graham Stuart Thomas, where they admirably demonstrate the virtues of restricted palette of colours, to enable subtle harmony with the gentle hues from the roses. Over half a century later, Mr. Thomas's skilful legacy lives on. On careful observation, the visitor becomes conscious of how perfectly schemed the plantings are.

In 1982, a decade after the garden was initially founded, the adjacent land to the north became available. This enabled further expansion of the collection; to accommodate rare varieties; which had been acquired by Mr. Thomas from the German National Rose Garden at Sangerhausen. The box hedge lined paths and stepping stones invite visitors to move from the perimeters of the garden between the masses of herbaceous plants, which provide ample colour and interest after the majority of the roses have finished flowering. Fine examples of the plantings include: campanulas, dianthus, hardy geraniums, peonies and aquilegia. The

latter are allowed to self-seed, but are thinned out when they germinate. Several old apples trees and surrounding walls support lanky growers and old climbers. Varieties to swoon over are: 'Lady Hillingdon', 'Gloire de Dijon', 'Alister Stella Gray' and 'Seven Sisters'. A number of magnificent climbing cultivars adorn the arches which gracefully clothe the walkways. These include: 'Princess Marie', 'Mme Sancy de Parabère', 'Debutante', 'Blush Boursault' and 'Adélaide d'Orléans', the latter named after one of the daughters of the Duc d'Orléans by the Duke's gardener, in 1826.



As you stroll around the gardens, it makes you feel that you're drifting back into the passages of time. A treasure trove of roses await to be discovered by the unsuspecting visitor; whether you are a seasoned expert of old roses, or new to the notion of growing these gorgeous legendary varieties. The collection is so inspirational, it simply encourages you to seriously consider the concept of preserving these cultivars for the enjoyment of future generations. Today the garden contains over 1,000 individual rose plants and over 417 varieties.

I must confess that I have an increasing fondness for Moss roses. Botanically, they are in fact evolved the from the form of Damask roses, that have developed a moss-like growth on the sepals of their blooms. If you gently stroke the prickles, they emit an additional resinous scent. These masterpieces

were very popular during Victorian times. Fine examples to be seen are: 'Général Kiéber', 'Gloire de Mousseux', 'Laneii' and 'Mme Landeau'.

Hybrid Perpetual types are crosses between Damasks and Chinas. Queen Victoria's resign saw a proliferation of the genus, which has quite large blooms. In many respects, they were the forerunners to the Hybrid Teas, and would have been exhibited on the show benches during Dean Hole's tenure as the first President of Britain's National Rose Society. As I wandered around the site I have found these superb HP cultivars: 'Desirée Fontaine', 'Her Majesty', 'Lady Stuart', 'Duke of Edinburgh' and 'Rose du Roi'.

Other curious and jewel-like treasures to enjoy are: 'Prosperity', a Hybrid Musk, 'Victor Parmentier', a Gallica, 'Jacques Cartier', a Portland, 'Lady Mary Fitzwilliam', a Hybrid Tea, 'Little White Pet', a Poly-Pom type and 'Sir Joseph Paxton', a Bourbon.

The current Senior Gardener, Michael Harvey said, "Summers are getting hotter and drier and roses don't do well in the heat. The red-brick walls hold the heat later in the evening than they used to. We're also seeing more storms, and the moisture and warmth together are causing an increase in pests and fungal diseases. Going forward, we might need to make some changes if we want to conserve these roses for the future."

I must confess that I'm not an expert of older types, but am fully aware that Mottisfont's magnificent walled garden is more than a mere rose collection. It's a living catalogue that chronicles the development of the modern rose to the present day. In midsummer, those gates are flung open, and warmly welcome many thousands of visitors whom will marvel at the spectacle. If you have never been enticed by the oldies, I thoroughly recommend that you come to



England and visit the gardens. I promise that you'll be enthralled by the roses; which are exceptionally unique, rather mystical, deliciously fragrant and elegantly beautiful.

## EXPERIMENTING ON GENETICS WITH THE 'ICEBERG' ROSE

At the beginning of this year, with all of the members of the Asociación Chilena de la Rosa, we started a friendly competition with the idea of manually hybridizing a new line of Chilean roses.

From the western deep south part of the world, our local association has been experimenting with some techniques based on Mendel's basic genetic laws. For this purpose, we were taught about the opportunities the rose 'Iceberg' had to offer.

The competition started on March, when we were returning back from summer holiday and we all gathered in the morning in the Parque Araucano Rose Garden for a manual pollination introductory lesson. After that, with materials in hand we collected pollen from closed rose blooms, that where in the "marshmallow" stage, and saved it in plastic small containers. Then, we were divided into groups to plan the strategy by choosing some probably great "mothers" for the next step of the project.

The only rule was to hybridize on 'Iceberg' to develop some research about the qualities of these mega-popular rose, which can be seen all over the country; from desert conditions to the coldest places in the Chilean Patagonia and is a classical selection for public places for its hardiness and pest resistance.

#### About 'Iceberg' Rose

'Iceberg' is a floribunda rose that was cultivated in Germany by the German breeder Reimer Kordes in 1958. It became one of the best well known roses in the world. In 1958, 'Iceberg' was awarded a Gold Medal by the Royal National Rose Society. The cultivar was selected as the "World's Favorite Rose" in 1983, by the World Federation of Rose Societies and appears in its "Rose Hall of Fame".

The resistance and popularity of this variety, which is found both as a shrub and as a climber, has seen widespread use, because it can adapt to many varieties of soil, but it grows better in a more acid soil that is fertile and loose, for good drainage. Another of its many qualities is that it also grows well in full sun and can do well in semi-shade.

'Iceberg' bears large clusters of medium sized lightly double, pure white flowers, sometimes tinged with pink in late summer. It flowers from early in the season until late in autumn. There is a light sweet fragrance that attracts pollinators.

It is ideal for mixed borders or simple rose borders and it can also grow in pots or containers and is extremely disease resistant, vigorous and floriferous.

The parents of the Iceberg are 'Robin Hood' and 'Virgo', the first being a floriferous dark pink medium size Hybrid Musk, and the second being a white Hybrid Tea rose, with big and healthy aspect.

As we have being discussing, at simple sight, the 'Iceberg' took the color from her mother but the habit and structure as her father. Both parents are vigorous and resistant.

Some reversive experiments have been done with the 'Iceberg' to go back to their parents, crossing 'Iceberg' as the mother *and* the father. That way, as the laws of Mendel says, it should revert closest to the parents. This reversion is done under the assumption that the natural laws will work but they have not been proved yet. We need to see the results in summer on the flowering season to make any conclusions.

#### Testing for new roses

After we collected pollen from our chosen varieties from the Parque Araucano Rose Garden, we gathered as small teams to cross pollinate the selected roses from our own gardens. To develop roses on a public park seems to be an impossible mission because of the lack of control. So we started choosing controlled mothers to keep an eye on the process and the development of the desired "red bud".

Recently, in autumn we have been collecting our labeled rose hips, and harvesting seeds to save them carefully labeled for future tracking. And the upcoming weeks we will be sowing our seeds in trays and keeping them in the fridge for at least 3 months.

On experimenting, you never know how the results will turn out, but every hybridizer has come up with new roses along that path. As with Kordes, David Austin, Meilland and other big hybridizer houses, hand pollination is the way to go to produce new rose varieties to offer to the market. Although you get new sprouts it does not mean that the new rose will be a superb new variety. In fact, it takes between 4 to 10 years to release a new worthy variety.

Sometimes the crossing goes on Mendel's recessive path, and the results are plants that are weak or not as pretty than the parents. But in time, it's a lottery and see if you get the best characteristics of both parents and you get a unique gem.

That's all of this about, playing the lottery to have fun and keeping our fingers crossed!





#### **Holocaust Education Center**

The history of community development through roses in Fukuyama began as a symbol of recovery from the devastation of war, with roses deeply cherished by the citizens as a symbol of revival. As a result, the people of Fukuyama have a strong connection between Roses and Peace. At the Holocaust Education Center in the city, a rose called 'Souvenir d'Anne Frank' is planted, and students are actively involved in propagating it.



In this tour, you will have the opportunity to hear from the students about their efforts and actions. These students, who love peace, are dedicated to passing on the painful history of the Holocaust. The Holocaust Education Center in Fukuyama was established in 1995 by Mr. Otsuka, who had a personal connection with Otto Frank, Anne Frank's father. Through interactions with the students, you will feel how deeply Mr. Otsuka's vision has been embraced by the local community, resulting in a growing number of meaningful actions.



## Garden Tomitani

Garden Tomitani won the Grand Prize in the Local Garden Category at the 2024 Fukuyama Rose Garden Competition. We will be holding 15 lectures at the Fukuyama New Castle Hotel near Fukuyama Station. You can learn about the latest fascinating research on roses, especially Japanese and Asian roses, from leading scholars and experts from around the world.



In this edition, we will feature the lecture theme for the third day, May 23, which is "**Disease Resistance**". (Please see past issues of *World Rose News* or visit the Convention website for other lecturers and themes.)

## Maria Eva Giorgioni (Italy): Rose Trial in Bologna and

Roses are a popular flowering plant in Italian gardens, with at least 24 native species. While hybrid tea roses were common in the mid-20th century, there has been a resurgence of old roses due to their hardiness, versatility, and historical significance. Numerous public and private rose gardens exist throughout Italy, with some specializing in old roses. Several of these gardens host international rose competitions and trials, contributing to the ongoing cultivation and appreciation of roses in Italy.

## Hayden Foulds (New Zealand): Improving Disease Tolerance in Roses

## - A Combination of Breeding and Culture

Roses can be susceptible to various diseases, but the occurrence of disease d of a pathogen, a susceptible host, and favorable environmental conditions. To froses, breeders have focused on developing disease-tolerant varieties. Go also play a crucial role in maintaining rose health. This lecture will examine enhance disease tolerance in roses, focusing on common diseases like black mildew. It will also explore the impact of cultivation practices on disease tolerfective management methods.

# Thomas Debener (Germany): Breeding for Disease Resistance: Scientific and Applied Aspects

Plants possess diverse defense mechanisms to resist diseases, ranging from physical barriers to complex biochemical processes. Genetic resistance can be broad or specific, with broader resistance typically being more durable. Roses, like other plants, exhibit various forms of disease resistance. While some sources of resistance have been identified and used in breeding, scientific approaches to disease resistance are not widely employed in commercial rose breeding. However, programs like the ADR trials and Earth-Kind® rose trials offer valuable tools for selecting disease-tolerant varieties.



#### 4th Period

## David Byrne (USA): Rose Rosette Disease in the Landscape and its

**Management** Rose Rosette Disease (RRD), a devastating disease caused spread by mites, emerged in the US in the 1990s and significantly impacted garden roses. The rose industry responded with a coordinated research program that led to advancements in diagnostics, understanding of the disease, management strategies, and development of resistant cultivars. While management strategies can help, the most effective approach is using RRD-resistant roses. Current research focuses on understanding the resistance mechanisms and developing tools to accelerate the breeding of resistant varieties.


## Q: I get errors in credit card payment.



## Access to Fukuyama

## **Narita International Airport (NRT)**

Narita Airport, serving the Greater Tokyo area, is a major international gateway, offering an extensive network of 102 routes to 101 cities across 38 countries and 3 regions (as of May 2024). Its global connections make it an excellent entry point for international travelers.

## **Other Airports**

In addition to Narita, travelers can conveniently access Japan through:

- **Haneda Airport (HND):** Another Tokyo-based hub offering extensive domestic and international connections.
- **Kansai International Airport (KIX):** Located near Osaka, ideal for exploring western Japan before heading to Fukuyama.



## Reaching Fukuyama

From these airports, getting to Fukuyama is straightforward:

- **By Air:** Hiroshima Airport (HIJ) is the closest airport to Fukuyama, with a direct one-hour bus service to the city.
- By Train: Fukuyama Station is a key stop on the Sanyo Shinkansen line, providing high-speed connections to major cities across Japan.


